News

England Hockey have announced a new structure for the Men's Premier Division and Vitality Women's Premier Division for the 2022/23 season.

From September to December, the 12 Premier Division teams will play each other once before the league, as was the case in 2021/22, before the league splits into an upper section and lower section, both consisting of six teams.

Phase Three involves two separate sections. In the first, the top eight are split into two pools of four, while the bottom four carry over their existing points from phases one and two and play each other once more, with the bottom two relegated to Division One North or South. The top two remain in the Premier Division.

From the pool stage in phase three, there will be a crossover tournament, 'Finals Weekend', hosted at a named club venue. The top team from Pool A will play second in Pool B and vice-versa in the two semi-finals, before a Third-Placed Play-Off and Final.

The winner of Finals Weekend will take England's top EuroHockey League spot, with the winner of the Premier Division (at the conclusion of Phase Two) taking the second spot.

An England Hockey statement added: "With a schedule aligned around international commitments it will also ensure that England international players can be available for selection for all England Hockey League weekends in 2022-23.

"As the season progresses the stakes will increase with every match potentially impacting on a club's finishing position. There are also innovations in place with the Premier Division Finals including pool games that could end in shoot-outs for a bonus point for matches that end in a draw. The pinnacle of the season will be finals at a club venue allowing a club to celebrate the best of domestic hockey at their venue.

"Each phase of the season also has a prize with a Euro Hockey League space available at the conclusion of the league phase and on the final day of the season at the Premier Division Final. Should the same team win both phases then the second Euro Hockey League spot will revert to the runners-up in the final.

"In the build-up to the new season we'll preview the England Hockey Leagues in more detail. allow clubs, players and us at England Hockey the opportunity to fully support the Leagues."

Chief Executive Nick Pink said, "I am very pleased with the structure from 2022-23 onwards and would like to thank everyone involved for their contribution. We have tried to engage with our clubs throughout the process and I believe we are in a good place now.

"This structure means there is something at stake right throughout the campaign, ensuring the highest possible level of competition across the season.

"I also believe it is important we stick to this structure for a number of seasons now, in order for it to bed in properly and allow clubs, players and us at England Hockey the opportunity to fully support the Leagues."



Holcombe looking to make impact in Men's Premier Division (13th October - England Hockey) Changes at Holcombe have put the Kent side in the frame for Men's Premier Division contention, reports Rod Gilmour of The Hockey Paper.

Holcombe believe they have one of the strongest squads in their Men's Premier Division history, as the Kent









side continue to aim for a top two finish for the first time.

The Medway outfit have seen a raft of changes over the summer, with Barry Middleton coming in as player-coach after Julian Halls' 12-year tenure ended. Meanwhile, Nick Bandurak combines his rising trajectory at international level with an all-encompassing role captaining the men's 1s and coaching the women's 1s.

Holcombe men have changed their style of play going forwards under Middleton, but already there is optimism for the season ahead after a win, loss and draw in their opening three games ahead of England Hockey's match of the weekend against Reading on Saturday evening.

Middleton was rated as one of the fittest players throughout his international career, even in his mid-thirties before retiring in 2018. The fitness remains, there's no doubt about that, but the challenge facing one of hockey's greatest players is seeing firsthand the changing nature of the modern game with his player-coach role.

"I'm probably okay for a nearly 39-year-old but trying to chase some of the international players who are getting fitter and the dynamic nature of the game now, it is hard work," he said.

"The game moves on. I stopped four years ago and it keeps getting more dynamic, the speed in which they play, the way they carry the ball, it just feels like the game is getting better."

Middleton, who is also a coach with the Great Britain Hockey EDP and under-21s, is staying in the UK to be with Holcombe this weekend, with the GB junior men's squad leaving for Malaysia ahead of the Sultan of Johor Cup.

"It's pretty good fun so far," he admitted. "There was freedom to do things in pre-season without the pressure of results. It is calm in some ways and some chaos with it. The challenges are how much to consider coaching and playing. That is still all to work out as you go along."

Middleton has help in the form of GB and England international David Ames, Holcombe's assistant coach who is currently sidelined with injury. "He is an absolute diamond working with Barry," says Keith Martin, Holcombe's team manager.

Further, they have also enlisted Giles Osbourne, for many years at Canterbury and Holcombe, as an assistant coach. Martin adds: "We have a really good new management system now, along with what we consider to be one of the strongest squads we've ever had in the Prem."

On the field, the signing of Phil Roper has given Holcombe further star appeal, alongside Bandurak, fresh from his 11 goals at the Commonwealth Games. His form in Birmingham has carried over into the 2022/23 Men's Premier Division season, scoring seven goals in nine games, including friendlies.

Middleton said: "It is brilliant for us. Everyone knows what Phil can bring. People also know the qualities of Banders and his skill set. They both are massive assets for us and it's about finding a way of fitting them in and over the year that will evolve. We've got a really nice group at the moment that enjoy being together, work hard and with quality too."

This includes Hayden Phillips, the Kiwi who has been at the club since the Rio Olympics, Jake Owen, Tom Russell and Scottish international Rob Field. "The attacking side is a group we want to express themselves," added Middleton.

Holcombe have also welcomed back South African international Mo Mea, injured on the eve of the Tokyo Olympics, while Chile international Jose Maldonado returned this week from the South American Games where La Roja lost to Argentina 3-1 at the weekend.

"We want to keep expanding the quality up there," Middleton says of the current strength in the Premier Division. "It used to be three and now it's up to eight.

"The league is hard early on to know who's where. We were nearly bottom of the league after the first few games. But we played the top three teams and lost by the odd goal to each of them. We had played well yet we were at the bottom. So it's where we are after the first four, five, six games and then you can see how it will shape out."

Holcombe will be looking to reverse a 3-0 defeat to champions Old Georgians last weekend. "I think they recognised that was one of the toughest games they've had for a long time," said Martin.


They last travelled to Reading in 2019 when the Berkshire side competed in the top flight. Holcombe came away with the points following a 3-2 victory while they have won three of their last five games at Sonning Lane.

"We really want to be in the top four this year and we have a squad strong enough to do that," said Martin. In Bandurak, they also have the scoring prowess to contend at the top. "Banders has done remarkably well since his call up to England/GB," added Martin.

"He has really jumped in with both feet on everything. GB and England, captain of men's 1s and coach of the women. We've tried to organise the fixtures so he can get to every women's game and he is earning his salary at the moment!"

Umpire in Profile

Name? Adrian Hu Age? 41

When did you qualify? 2000

What level have you qualified to? Level 2

What made you start umpiring? The club were short of umpires so quite a few of us did it at the same time, including Amy who got a better theory score than I did.

What level have you played at? Regional with Holcombe's 3bs

Has umpiring helped you as a player? Initially no, I will call it youthful ignorance but it made me question the umpires more often as I could see what had happened better than them. It cost me quite a few yellow cards. But once I started umpiring regularly, yes massively. You learn how to communicate better on the pitch, you appreciate what the umpire can and can't reasonably see and you also learn how to make situations benefit you if you know what umpires are looking for. A better understanding of the rules can only help. How is umpiring personally rewarding? I umpire one league below national league and last season I did my first National League game, as well as this pre-season umpiring our men's 1XI in a friendly against Wimbledon. Being involved in games like that, which I would never have got close to as a player, is fantastic. Being able to contribute to a game played at a high skill level and have the players and coaches thank you for helping the game is good to hear.

Aims for your future in umpiring? To reach level 3 and get the NPUA badge.

Hardest part of umpiring? The time it can take up when taking appointed games. Travelling to Ipswich, Norwich, Peterborough for the games means I am gone all day and so can't play but more importantly I can go a whole Saturday without seeing the girls which can be tough on them, especially now Gaby is also playing.

Hardest individual decision to get right? Probably being consistent with the aerial ball. It doesn't help that the rules around it keep changing! Also, judging a deliberate breaking down of play compared to just a clumsy tackle. At a higher level it is easier to assume everything is deliberate (so taking the decision to make a tackle, not necessarily making a foul on purpose!) but the player in you wants to have some degree of sympathy with the players.

Favourite part of umpiring? Coming off after a challenging game and knowing you have done all you can to keep the players on the pitch and the game flowing. Even if the players have tried not to.

Best coaching advice received? Recently, all about getting to the baseline as early as possible and letting play come at you. It makes it so much easier. But one of the most simple is to smile while you umpire, enjoy it. If you are talking to players and trying to explain things in a confrontational manner, it makes things worse. Stay relaxed and smile as you are penalising them and they find it harder to argue. And use the captains, it is their responsibility to control the players.


Best umpiring experience? When Holcombe hosted the women's EuroHockey Club Trophy, the Saturday evening had a Holcombe vs. Hockey for Heroes game which I umpired. 500 people watching, a running commentary and some real quality on the pitch. It was great umpiring with an atmosphere like that. Qualitywise, the Holcombe vs. Wimbledon match.


Ever given a red card? Sadly, yes. Two. One was for swearing at me, leading to a 10-minute yellow and then continuing to swear while walking away so it had to be upgraded. The second was for violent conduct as a player's stick made contact with the face of a opponent after a bad tackle from that opponent. Result was a yellow card for the initial challenge, a 10-minute yellow for the reaction from another player and a red for the raised stick. The game could easily have been destroyed at that point, but by taking time to speak to my colleague and make sure the injured party was ok, and then delivering the cards in a controlled manner and explaining it to the captains, the rest of the game was ok!


